Notes on our worship today:

The psalmist calls on the natural world, celestial bodies, fire and earth, creatures, and all humanity, to praise God. The voices of Simeon and 84-year-old Anna join the chorus today, recognizing what God is doing in Jesus. Simeon's song is often sung after communion, for we have seen God's salvation in the assembled community and have held Jesus in our hands in the bread. Then, like the prophet Anna, we tell of Jesus to all who look for the healing of the world.

At ringing of a bell, the assembly stands and faces the font. All may make the sign of the cross, the sign that is marked at baptism, as the presiding minister begins.

First Reading: Isaiah 61:10—62:3

To the people who returned to Jerusalem after the exile, the prophet proclaims that God's salvation will fully come to pass. Jerusalem will become a shining light to the nations and righteousness and praise will spring up as surely as the earth puts forth vegetation.

Second Reading: Galatians 4:4-7

Paul seeks to show the Galatians that the purpose of Christ's birth was to liberate us from the law's condemnation so that we would be fully adopted into God's family as beloved children.

A reading from Galatians.


⁴When the fullness of time had come, God sent the Son, born of a woman, born under the law, ⁵in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children. ⁶And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of the Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" ⁷So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir through God.

Holy Gospel: Luke 2:22-40

Luke's narrative continues with stories that emphasize Jesus' connection to Judaism. His family is devout in its observance of the law, and Jesus himself is recognized as one who will bring glory to Israel.

The holy gospel according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

²²When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses,

'Mary and Joseph' brought 'Jesus' up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord

²³(as it is written in the law of the Lord,

"Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"),

²⁴and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord,

"a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him.
26It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah.
27Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what was customary under the law,
28Simeon took Jesus in his arms and praised God, saying,
29"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;
30 for my eyes have seen your salvation,
31 which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

³²a light for revelation to the gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." ▶ ³³And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him.

³⁴Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary,

"This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel and to be a sign that will be opposed

³⁵so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul, too."

³⁶There was also a prophet,

Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher.

She was of a great age,

having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage,

³⁷then as a widow to the age of eighty-four.

She never left the temple

but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day.

 $^{\rm 38}{\rm At}$ that moment she came and began to praise God and to speak about the child

to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹When Mary and Joseph had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom, and the favor of God was upon him.


Offering Prayer


Let us pray.



Thanksgiving at Table XI

We give you thanks, Father, through Jesus Christ, your beloved Son, whom you sent in this end of the ages to save and redeem us and to proclaim to us your will.

He is your Word, inseparable from you, through whom you created all things, and in whom you take delight.
He is your Word, sent from heaven to a virgin's womb. He there took on our nature and our lot and was shown forth as your Son, born of the Holy Spirit and of the virgin Mary. He, our Lord Jesus, fulfilled all your will and won for you a holy people; he stretched out his hands in suffering in order to free from suffering those who trust you.

He is the one who, handed over to a death he freely accepted, in order to destroy death, to break the bonds of the evil one, to crush hell underfoot, to give light to the righteous, to establish his covenant, and to show forth the resurrection, taking bread and giving thanks to you, said:

Take and eat; this is my body, given for you.

Send your Spirit upon these gifts of your church; gather into one all who share this bread and wine; fill us with your Holy Spirit to establish our faith in truth, that we may praise and glorify you through your Son Jesus Christ; through whom all glory and honor are yours, almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy church, both now and forever. **Amen**.




Breaking of Bread and Invitation to Communion

Taste and see that the Lord is good.


At the direction of ushers, baptized and communing participants in the assembly wishing to commune will proceed to the front of the nave by the center aisle in a continuous line. Others may also come forward for a blessing. You will be invited to kneel, or remain standing if you prefer, at the rail. To receive the bread, place your hands palms up and level so that the presiding minister may place the bread onto your uplifted hands. Using a receptacle, such as a small juice glass which you have brought from home, hold it firmly so that the assisting minister is able to pour wine from the common cup into your individual glass. For health safety reasons, you may not dip the bread into the wine in the chalice. You may also elect to commune by receiving the bread only. Gluten free hosts are available to those who need that option. Once you have received the bread and wine, you will be invited to stand and return to your places by the side aisles with the words "Go in peace."
